PARENTAL NOTIFICATION

Under the Elementary and Secondary Education Act (ESEA)

Under the Elementary and Secondary Education Act (ESEA), the Department of Education (DOE) makes it a priority to ensure that all students have access to a high-quality education. This includes ensuring that parents are fully informed and have an opportunity to participate in their child's education. The law requires states to provide parents with timely information and to ensure that parents are able to exercise their right to choose an alternative educational setting for their child.

Written complaint procedures appropriate to the State Educational Agency's (SEA) private school officials or representatives, adequate information of a federal statute or regulation that applies, written complaint procedures for resolving issues of violation of

Teacher qualifications and non-highly qualified teachers. The law requires that parents be notified of the highly qualified status of their child's teacher. The law also requires that parents be notified of the qualifications of their child's teacher.

In its plan, the law requires that any eligible entity receiving a subgrant under ESEA shall include

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education program. The school or district must identify and assess a child at least 40% of the children in the area of enrollment if the school are from low-income families. (20 U.S.C. 9852(c) [ESEA Title I, Part A, 8114])

Parents must be notified of the school or district's plan for the child's educational program. Parents, teachers, principals, schools and the district must work together so that the teachers, principals, other staff, and schools can coordinate the child's program. If a child is not making satisfactory progress, the school or district must take steps to improve the child's educational achievement. (20 U.S.C. 9852(d) [ESEA Title I, Part A, 8114])

The school or district must make a reasonable effort to inform and involve parents in the child's education and to prevent or resolve any problems that may arise. The school or district must also make a reasonable effort to provide information to parents about the child's educational progress and to provide information to parents about the child's educational program. (20 U.S.C. 9852(e) [ESEA Title I, Part A, 8114])
